Renaissance Zone Approves First Projects

In its first year of existence, Kindred Renaissance Zone has approved two projects - one residential and commercial.

The first project, a residential remodel on Linden St., was a great fit for the new Renaissance Zone. Lance and Nokleberg are extensively renovating a previously vacant house. Since they had

already started renovation their when the RZ formed. they included the improvements that they hadn't yet begun - roofing, shingles, gutters to name a few.

The first commercial project was approved just last month. Nate Opgrand, owner of Korner Holdings, is constructing multi-use facility with fueling station. The project revitalize parcel of land with dilapidated,


vacant building and will be replacing it with a new structure. The project will also help to increase tax base, create jobs, and help to expand current businesses and/or create new ones.

"The Renaissance Zone Program is great for residential commercial property owners who want to benefit from tax exemptions while investing in their property," said Jamie R. Swenson, Renaissance Zone Committee President. "The program is perfect for small, rural communities where housing growth isn't as abundant. It can also help attract businesses and improve deteriorating properties to curtail a decline in tax base.

"Flush This, NOT That": A Cautionary Tale

Although the things you flush down your toilet and pour down your drains MAY make it through your own home's plumbing, that doesn't always mean they aren't causing trouble down the line for your neighbors or city's sewer. The small "convenience" of you flushing garbage town the toilet or pouring grease down the kitchen sink could mean a HUGE headache for a neighbor or the community if costly repairs or cleanup are required.

A recent sewer backup in Kindred demonstrates just how important it is for everyone to practice responsible stewardship of the city's sewer infrastructure. In this particular incident, there was a massive buildup of grease and extraneous debris that caused the floats in the lift station to become stuck, therefore unable to activate the pumps.

Once the pumps stopped running, the system filled to near capacity and began backing up into the lines. Once notified, the city was able to override the panel and set the pumps to manual operations. Luckily, a contractor was able to come on SuperBowl Sunday to clear the buildup and get the system operational that day.



What Can I Flush? The 3 Ps

The list of what is OK to flush is short and easy to remember, so we'll start with that:



That's easy, right? These are the only things that should be headed out to the lagoon.

What NOT to Send Down the Drain (basically, anything other than the 3 Ps)

Wipes

"Flushable" wipes are anything <u>BUT</u>. No matter what's on the label, "flushable" wipes (sani-wipes, baby, facial or makeup remover wipes, etc.) do not disintegrate in the water like toilet paper does and can clog sewer pipes.

Grease/Fat/Oils

While it might be liquid when it enters the pipes, grease cools and solidifies quickly. Grease from melted bacon fat, meats and gravy, milk, cheese, lard/butter can clog your drains and produce horrific smells. Let it cool, then scrape it into the garbage.

Eggshells, Coffee grounds, Food

These fragments may seem small, but they can seriously block your drain in no time! Food may be biodegradable, but it can lodge in the plumbing before it begins decomposing. It goes in the trash, or better yet - compost!

Toilet Paper Rolls/Diapers/Paper Towels These items absorb liquid, not break apart in it. Send them to their home...the trash can.

Paint

Whether water-soluble or not, paint should NEVER be disposed of down any drain; do not wash brushes and other paint items in the sink.

Cigarettes

Quit smoking. It's bad for your pipes- lung and sewer. But if you can't quit, throw your extinguished butts in the trash.

Chewing Gum

Chewing gum also never dissolves in water and can adhere to other items and clog pipes.

Q-tips/Cotton balls/Band-aids

These items do not dissolve in water and can easily lodge and create a logjam in your pipes.



Medication/Drugs

Toilet water cannot destroy the active ingredients in medicines or illegal drugs. Liquid medication and pills can have a very negative effect on the environment and water supply.

Feminine Hygiene Products/Condoms

These products require no explanation, just don't flush.

Kitty Litter/Dried Poop from Litter box Kitty litter and all it's special friends in the box should be bagged up and disposed of in the garbage.

Hair

Hair never dissolves in water. It can float and easily get snagged on debris in the pipes.




